Douglass sagt, dass es die Angst ist, die viele Sklaven in der Zwangsknechtschaft hält, denn wenn sie die Wahrheit sagen, werden sie von ihren Besitzern bestraft. An diesem Punkt der Erzählung wird Douglass nach Baltimore, Maryland, versetzt. Dieser Umzug ist für ihn sehr wichtig, denn er glaubt, dass er sein ganzes Leben lang ein Sklave geblieben wäre, wenn er nicht umgesiedelt worden wäre. Er beginnt sogar, Hoffnung auf ein besseres Leben in der Zukunft zu haben. Er spricht auch über seine neue Herrin, Mrs. Sophia Auld, die anfangs eine sehr freundliche Frau ist, aber schließlich grausam wird. Douglass lernt von dieser Frau das Alphabet und das Buchstabieren kleiner Wörter, aber ihr Ehemann, Mr. Auld, missbilligt dies und erklärt, dass Sklaven, wenn sie lesen könnten, nicht als Sklaven geeignet wären, da sie unbeherrschbar und traurig seien. Als er erfährt, warum Mr. Auld es ablehnt, dass Sklaven das Lesen beigebracht wird, erkennt Douglass die Bedeutung des Lesens und die Möglichkeiten, die ihm diese Fähigkeit bieten könnte. Er nimmt es auf sich, lesen zu lernen und alles zu lernen, was er kann, aber manchmal quält ihn diese neu gefundene Fähigkeit. Dann lernt Douglass das Wort Abschaffung kennen und entwickelt die Idee, in den Norden zu fliehen. Er lernt auch, wie man schreibt und wie man gut liest. Im Alter von zehn oder elf Jahren stirbt Douglass' Herr, und sein Besitz wird unter dem Sohn und der Tochter des Herrn aufgeteilt. Die Sklaven werden zusammen mit dem Vieh geschätzt, wodurch Douglass einen neuen Hass auf die Sklaverei entwickelt.
